# Overview

With the kaupapa of contributing towards a better Rotorua for all at the heart of its work, the Rotorua Energy Charitable Trust is a community-focused, not-for-profit organisation.

Formed in 1994 out of the sale of Rotorua Electricity Limited, the initial capital of \$32 million has grown to over \$150 million. More than \$110 million has been invested back into the Rotorua community since its formation, benefitting a broad range of initiatives and people across the community.

The Trust aims to effectively and responsibly manage and grow its assets for the long-term benefit of Rotorua, ensuring funds generated are directed to the groups that positively impact the community.

Over the past year, the Trust has identified five key priority areas for funding to best ensure the work it does reaches those who will benefit the most from it. The areas - Health and the First 1,000 Days, Education and Employment, Strengthening Communities, Vibrancy and Energy and the Environment - cover a wide range of initiatives and give the Trust added clarity around the ways it can help make a difference.

Collaborating with other community organisations and initiatives is key for the Trust, as is playing a major role in providing advice and facilitation services, connecting people and organisations to make better things happen in the community.

Overseen by six trustees who were elected by the Rotorua community in November 2016, the Trust actively engages with and supports a diverse range of community stakeholders.

The Trust is conscious of its role to balance the needs of today, while maintaining a legacy for tomorrow and supporting a better Rotorua for all.

# Chairman's report

Kia ora koutou, I am pleased to report on another significant year for the Rotorua Energy Charitable Trust. It has been our privilege to work with so many groups who are making a real difference in the Rotorua community.



The past 12 months has seen our new trustees settle into their roles and put in the time to ensure the Trust is focused on, and well positioned for, the future.

Trustees have undertaken considerable work reviewing the strategic direction of the Trust, focusing our attention on the areas where we can help make the most impact, while at the same time collaborating with fellow funders and providers to ensure the best possible collective outcomes are achieved for Rotorua.

This has seen the development of our strategic plan and a simple but effective kaupapa statement - "A better Rotorua for all", which now guides us in everything we do. This kaupapa, alongside our five key areas of focus, gives the Trust a renewed drive and clarity around the ways we can help make the most impact for our community.

Part of this has included identifying our role as more than just a funding provider, simply making grants. Instead, we have focused on how we can do more to facilitate good things happening in our community. As a result, we have committed operational funding in our current budget to help ensure the right people are talking to each other and sharing learnings.

The previous 12 months has also seen two major projects the Trust has supported in past years reach fruition. In February, Te Aka Mauri, which incorporates the new library and

Rotorua Children's Health Hub, opened. The Trust contributed a total of \$800,000 to the Lakes District Health Board and the Rotorua Lakes Council towards this project - the first of its kind in New Zealand. A world leading dementia facility based in Ngongotaha, The CARE Village, also opened its doors this year, following a \$750,000 grant in 2014.

Trustees have continued to be directly engaged with a range of local community groups. A personal highlight was the Trust's hosting of 40 caregivers at a mid-winter dinner at Toi Ohomai. This event crystallised for me the tremendous spirit and sense of giving that is such a feature of our Rotorua community.

I am proud to have a strong group of trustees who continue to contribute in their respective fields - whether that be national or local body politics, as chair of Philanthropy New Zealand or on a host of other local and national committees - without losing sight of the need to engage at a personal level with individuals and groups across the Rotorua community.

While we have had to make some tough calls along the way, these have been necessary to ensure we are able to deliver a better Rotorua for all for the longer term.

These have included the impairment and eventual sale of one of our direct investments, as well as the implementation of even more stringent processes around the management of conflicts of interest. We have also decided to hold off on

purchasing further artwork for the Heritage Collection until storage and display space is restored.

This coming year will bring changes too, and it is with sadness we say goodbye to Alison Perrin, who has made an immeasurable contribution to the Trust over the 15 years she has served as our grants assessor. We know she will be missed, by both fellow trustees and staff who value her experience and advice, as well as the countless community organisations whom she has assisted and built relationships with. We wish Alison all the best for her retirement.

I also wish to acknowledge the efforts of our staff members, Tony and Lee-Anne who alongside Alison ensure the smooth and efficient operation of the Trust on a daily basis.

Once again, thanks must go my fellow trustees for their hard work over the past 12 months, and the collaborative approach they have taken to their governance roles.

Following the significant progress over the past 12 months in determining the Trust's key priorities, the work continues to ensure we are fulfilling our kaupapa and continuing to help improve the community we are privileged to call home.

# Trust Manager's report

Tēnā koutou katoa, I am delighted to be able to share with you news of another strong year for the Rotorua Energy Charitable Trust. We're now starting to see the tangible signs of change as we implement actions to help achieve the Trust's upgraded strategic priorities while continuing to maintain a focus on operating as efficiently as we can.

Our new operating model, where all investment and financial services are contracted to external experts, is now firmly bedded in and we are reaping the benefits of this decision.

Fund manager Mercer (NZ) Ltd, who manage the majority of the Trust's investments, delivered an 8.8% return on Trust funds for the year. This strong result was offset by a negative return on some of the Trust's legacy investments which we are still looking to transition from. The overall return for the year was 7.9%, helping boost the Trust's total assets to over \$150 million by year end.

The Trust accounting and financial services continue to be provided by the team at BDO Rotorua with whom a strong and effective working relationship has been developed.

We've also worked to build relationships with a range of entities that engage directly at all levels of our community – from Rotorua X and the Rotorua Chamber of Commerce to iwi groups, Toi Ohomai, Lakes District Health Board, and local and national government agencies.

This commitment to strengthen relationships is further demonstrated through the Trust's collaboration with other local funders and service providers to ensure the most significant funding impact is achieved. This has seen the Trust support Bay Brighter Futures and the Vital Signs Research initiative. We're also pleased to have been able to make office space available in the Trust's Eruera St

premises to BayTrust and Bay Brighter Futures.

It's more than just fellow funders that the Trust's premises have been made available to. A number of community groups have used the Trust's board and meeting rooms for training and meetings over the past year. The building has quickly become a vibrant and much used community asset.

Over the past 12 months, we have launched a new, more accessible and informative website, which allows us to better highlight the work we are doing within the community. Our Facebook page continues to strengthen with more than 1,000 followers and it was particularly pleasing to see our 2017 Young Achievers post viewed by more than 20,000 people.

Significant work has gone on behind the scenes this year, ensuring the Trust is focused on the future and in the best position to be able to help where needed. This has included removing our previous funding cap, alongside a review of all grant-related policies, with the objective of making the Trust as accessible as possible and positioned in the best way to meet community needs.

I would like to offer my sincere thanks to our trustees for their drive and commitment over the past 12 months and the significant work they have done to ensure the Trust has a clear direction.

What we have achieved would not

have been possible without the hard work of our staff, Alison and Lee-Anne who make a strong contribution to the Trust's operation.

I pay particular tribute to Alison as she retires from the Trust after 15 years as our grants assessor. It is to her credit that she has become known as the face of Rotorua Trust. She has without question made a significant and enduring contribution to countless organisations across our community.

We look forward to building on her good work with so many community groups in the years ahead.

# Health and The First 1,000 Days

Maintaining good health has positive impacts across a host of the Trust's priority areas.

The Trust recognises that Rotorua has its share of health challenges. However, by contributing to organisations, activities and events, which can help improve the wellbeing of Rotorua people, trustees are confident that a range of positive outcomes and wide reaching benefits will be delivered.

A particular focus is on The First 1,000 days. This period – from conception to the time a child is about two-years-old – is universally recognised as a key time in shaping a child's prospects for the future.

Through the support of projects targeted at this period, we are giving

our most vulnerable the best possible start in life, and improving their outcomes as they grow into adults.

The Trust has also continued its funding (\$250,000) towards the WISE Healthy Homes programme which provides insulation for households with low disposable incomes. This follows similar grants over the previous three years which have also provided leverage for other funders to come on board. Since 2014, over 2,000 houses in Rotorua have been insulated under this programme.

Other grants supporting health and the first 1,000 days include those to The Institute for Child Protection Studies Trust (\$25,000) and Aratika Trust (\$12,000) for its work offering cancer support.



## SPOTLIGHT - Tipu Ora's Kia Pakari Young Dads Service

Kia Pakari, an intervention service helping young Rotorua men become better fathers is bridging a gap in our community. The holistic wrap-around service supports 21 dads aged between 13-25. Rotorua Trust's funding (\$25,000) was part of a collaborative funding effort between funders allowing the programme to

establish an important space, where dads can talk openly and learn and grow in a safe and supportive environment. Two full-time staff are employed. Kia Pakari says the service has a strong focus on supporting whanau to build their capacity and capability to be better parents and caregivers.

# Education and Employment

Ensuring Rotorua's young people are able to access quality education is a priority for the Trust, as is the subsequent transition into the workplace.

With 40 per cent of Rotorua's population attending either school or pre-school - or with a family member who is - education has a wide-reaching impact on our community. It is a foundation for success and the platform for future employment and other opportunities.

Equally, it is important that support for our next generation doesn't stop when they finish their schooling so the Trust's commitment continues by supporting a successful transition into the workforce.

One of the ways we do this is by ensuring Rotorua youth know the options available and are given the means to access these. We continue to support the Rotorua Careers Expo (\$9,000) which draws thousands of students and provides a chance for young people to link future jobs with future training and see what opportunities are available.

We've also continued our support of the ever popular Rotorua Young Achievers programme which, for the past two decades, has celebrated some of Rotorua's most talented students.

## SPOTLIGHT - Rotorua Youth Centre

The Rotorua Youth Centre is helping the next generation into the workforce. The Centre offers support to young people with a variety of services and programmes relating to motivation and identity, social needs, health and wellbeing and direction and pathways. Rotorua Trust's funding (\$20,000) supports skills and work exploration, such as photography, barista training and cooking. It also helps facilitate

work experience through the Youth Hub, leadership and event management, outdoor recreation and sports and driver licensing. Through this, participants can gain NZQA unit standards while others have progressed to work experience and paid study scholarships. Over the past year, 13 young people have been placed in full or part-time employment.



# Vibrancy

Arts, cultural and sporting events all add a sense of colour and life beyond the ordinary and help enhance the experience of living in Rotorua.

Because of this, a key priority for the Trust is helping support local organisations and ventures to produce a wide range of events and activities, ranging from grassroots events to those which attract national and international attention.

Events supported over the past financial year include Rotorua's Matariki celebrations (\$5,000), Stage Challenge Foundation (\$6,000), Rhapsody Rotorua (\$15,000) and a Touch NZ national tournament (\$5,000).

Once again, the Trust supported Lakeside, with a \$50,000 grant. The 2018 event, Whenua #itsabouthome, showcased local artists and proved a big success.

Trust funding (\$5,000) also went towards hosting the Singlespeed World Championships which attracted 600 competitors, including a large international contingent, more than 2,000 spectators and a significant amount of post-event media showcasing the event and Rotorua to the world.

The Trust is also passionate about celebrating and preserving Rotorua's rich history and culture, continuing its ongoing support of the Rotorua Civic Arts Trust (\$70,000) as well as the bi-annual Te Arawa Kapa Haka Regional Festival (\$15,000).

## SPOTLIGHT - City of Rotorua Highland Pipe Band

When the sounds of bagpipes filled the streets of Rotorua during the 2018 New Zealand Pipe Band Championship, it was thanks to the support of Rotorua Trust. It is the first time in 20 years Rotorua has hosted the championships. Thanks to the support of the community, it was an outstanding event that had nothing

but positive feedback. More than 40 bands competed, bringing thousands of people into the city over the four-day competition. The City of Rotorua Highland Pipe Band, who were responsible for organising the event, credits the support of the Trust for helping make the event so successful.



# Strengthening Communities

Strong communities are an essential part of our kaupapa – “A better Rotorua for all” and helping to build a strong and vibrant community which recognises and celebrates Rotorua’s special character is one of the Trust’s key aims.

Each year the Trust supports the community in a myriad of ways, whether it be working with whanau and families, empowering community groups to deliver effective solutions, or directly supporting the challenges faced by a diverse and ageing population - connectivity and community is an underpinning commitment to all that we do.

Over the past 12 months we’ve helped play a role in supporting those who work tirelessly to make our community a better place by funding organisations that have a positive impact across the community, including Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Trust NZ (\$15,000), Love Soup Rotorua (\$10,000), Linton Park Community Trust (\$7,000) and Sport BOP Inc towards a feasibility study into the redevelopment of Smallbone Park, as well as a range of activity programmes including Play in the Bay, Virtually on Track and a fall prevention programme for the elderly (\$22,000).

## SPOTLIGHT - Ka Pai Kai

Ka Pai Kai's vision is to nourish the minds of the future generation by offering healthy lunches at cost price to local low decile schools. Not only are they fighting obesity, but they've created an equity culture, providing children with the basics so they can excel in their education. By providing nutritious lunches, schools report less absenteeism and significantly improved behaviour in the classroom after lunch. Children are more excited about coming to school

knowing they're going to get a healthy lunch. To provide lunches at cost price Ka Pai Kai relies on funding from the community, such as the \$10,800 grant from Rotorua Trust, to help with set-up costs, including a 12-month kitchen lease. Ka Pai Kai lease the Taharangi Marae kitchen, to prepare meals. This money is used by the Marae, to help them fund the work they do in youth justice, so goes full circle, straight back into the community.



# Energy and Environment

Maintaining a healthy environment is important to us as New Zealanders and protecting Rotorua's unique natural assets rests even more closely with us.

As a Trust founded by the sale of electricity interests, projects of an energy nature fit closely with our kaupapa.

Reducing environmental impact and improving energy efficiency are important ways we can help make a difference.

Over the past year the Trust has helped several early childhood providers become more energy efficient through grants to install heat pumps, which has the flow on effect of keeping children warmer and healthier.

We have also supported the Lakes Water Quality Society with a grant of \$4,000 towards a lakes water quality symposium.

Meanwhile a \$10,000 grant to Te Arawa Lakes Trust for environmental forums has provided another opportunity to proactively engage with the whānau, hapū and iwi of Te Arawa, and the wider community, to explore ways to work together to improve our environment, in particular, our lakes.

## SPOTLIGHT -

### Central Kids Homedale (also pictured on the front cover)

Central Kids Homedale has been able to foster a kaupapa of environmental awareness, kaitiakitanga (guardianship of the land) and community, thanks to the support of a Rotorua Trust grant (\$5,000) and Bunnings Warehouse. The money went towards two projects to enhance their environment and learning programme – the installation of a heat pump and the creation of two raised garden beds, purchase of garden tools and wet weather gear. The vegetable gardens use

reserve land and the land development includes a natural pathway, which links the two gardens and provides access for the children. The gardens are set at a good height to allow the children to do planting, maintaining and harvesting. The experiences with nature and growing food to eat, cook and share, provides the children with a rich and genuine experience of nature, science and citizenship.

# Governance

The Rotorua Energy Charitable Trust (the Trust) is a Charitable Trust established pursuant to the Energy Companies Act 1992. It is incorporated under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 and the Charities Act 2005.

## ROLE OF THE BOARD

The Trust's six Trustees are elected by voters from within the voting district of the Trust on a triennial basis, and are responsible for the direction and supervision of the Trust's business. The Board has determined that its principle responsibility is to manage and enhance the assets held by the Trust and distribute income for the long-term benefit of the Rotorua community. In meeting this responsibility, the Board approves the adoption of appropriate strategies and objectives and reviews the performance of the Trust against these objectives. They also approve operating and grant budgets and review operating performance against budgeted performance.

## DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY

The formulation and implementation of reporting procedures, other than those reserved specifically for the Board, are delegated to management. The Board monitors that delegation as part of the formal business of the Board meetings.

## CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

It is recognised that Trustees have a wide range of involvement in the Rotorua district community and as such, the potential for conflict will arise from time to time. In order to cover this eventuality, Trustees who disclose their involvement or relationship with other organisations do not take part in discussions relating to said organisation (unless the

consent of fellow Trustees is obtained), and do not vote on any matter where a conflict or potential conflict exists.

## INVESTMENT

Investment decisions relating to the Trust's Perpetual Capital Fund are undertaken in accordance with the Statement of Investment Policies and Objectives, which has been determined by the Trustees. With the exception of certain legacy investments, which are being exited over time, management of the Trust's investment portfolio has been undertaken by Mercer (NZ) Limited since 1 April 2015.

## GRANTS

Grant requests are received and processed by management. The requests, together with management recommendations, are presented to the Board where a formal decision is made. At the start of each financial year, the Board determines the allocation and level of grant funding to various sectors. The Board also appoints individual Trustees to represent these sectors at monthly Board meetings.

## COMMITTEES

The Board has formally established two sub-committees to assist with the operation of the Trust.

### Executive

- Monitoring the systems of corporate governance
- Establishing and reviewing the remuneration policy for the Board
- Reviewing the trust manager's performance and remuneration

### Audit

### This committee is responsible for:

- Identifying, assessing and managing business and organisational risk, and assisting the Board in the discharge of its financial reporting responsibilities
- Reviewing the effectiveness of internal control systems
- Providing a formal forum for the Board, auditors and staff
- Agreeing with the external auditors on the nature, scope and cost of the audit
- Ensuring the Board meets financial reporting requirements and that external reporting of information is of a high quality
